Badge News

GNAS has come around to the Longbow Archers, and allowed them to claim Rose Awards with special badges. Rounds for which claims can be made against are York for gentlemen, Hereford for the ladies and Bristols for the juniors.

The target scores for colours are: White 225, Black 300, Blue 375, Red 450, Gold 525 and Purple 600. These can be claimed from GNAS via a Rose Award shoot and filling in the paperwork held with the Tournament Organiser. The badges are free of charge.

We have decided to follow GNAS and allow DCAS Roses to be claimed by Longbow archers. The qualifying scores have been set at 225 for White, 275 for Black, 325 for Blue, 375 for Red and 425 for Gold. They can be claimed on the day from a representative of DCAS at a cost of £1.50.

FITA however still do not have Star Awards for Longbows. DCAS are leading the way for FITA, and we have decided to allow Longbow archers to claim DCAS FITA Stars. The qualifying rounds are Gents FITA for the Gents, Ladies FITA for the Ladies and Metrics for the Juniors. The required scores are White 325, Black 375, Blue 425, Red 475 and Gold 525. Again these can be claimed on the day from a DCAS representative for £1.50

FITA Star Badges for Juniors

FITA recognises Juniors in four groups. All girls up to and during the year of your 16th birthday are known as Cadet Women. Likewise, boys up to and during the year of your 16th birthday are known as Cadet Men. All girls up to and during the year of your 18th birthday are known as Junior Women, and boys up to and during the year of your 18th birthday.

The shooting distances are:

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Cadet Women	60M, 50M, 40M and 30M (As Metric 2)		
Cadet Men	70M, 60M, 50M and 30M (As Metric 1)		
Junior Women	70M, 60M, 50M and 30M (As Ladies FITA)		
Junior Men	90M, 70M, 50M and 30M (As Gents FITA)		
The qualifying scores	for badges are the same as the Seniors.	1000 White, 1100 Black, 1200 Blue, 1300 R	ed,

1350 Gold and 1400 Purple.

Being a Club Records Officer

Every archer has a classification, ranging from Grand Master Bowman to Third Class outdoors, and from A to H indoors. Each archer also has a handicap rating which ranges between 1 and 100. These are both recorded on their personal record, which I maintain. The classifications and handicaps are worked out in accordance with the national scheme administered by the Grand National Archery Society. GNAS publish a book with instructions and tables from which I am able to work out all the accomplished figures. Classifications are looked up in the tables, which show each round separated into compound and recurve bow types. These are then sub-divided into Ladies and Gents, and again into age groups for juniors.

When you submit a score, I work out the classification and enter it onto your record. To gain a certain classification, you have to shoot three scores that reach that level or higher. Therefore, two second class rounds and a first class round would give you a second-class achievement. Annual requalification is necessary to maintain a classification. Classifications are used in most competitions to group archers according to their ability, with prizes being awarded in each category ie: 1st class, 2nd class, 3rd class, or novice, which is for competitors who have been shooting for less than 12 months.

Handicaps are found in a separate table, which is used for all archers and styles. To obtain a handicap, the average figure achieved from your first three rounds is taken. After this initial handicap has been worked out, each time you hand in a score with a lower handicap, half the difference between these two is subtracted to give your new handicap! Handicaps are rarely used, but when they are they allow archers of all abilities to compete together. There are published tables, which allocate an allowance for a particular round and handicap. If an archer shoots to his or her handicap, that score, when added to their handicap, will equal 1440.

It is every archer's responsibility to inform the Records Officer of rounds shot. The minimum information required is: your name, what round was shot, the date, place, score and for completeness hits and golds.

I am also responsible for entering the club into the various postal leagues we shoot in, for collating the league shoot results, completing the league returns and maintaining the league records.

Once a league shoot has taken place, I put all the scores in order, highest to lowest. I then complete the league return, taking the top scores in order to make up the "A" team, then the next highest scores for the "B" team, and so on. The completed forms are posted to the league organiser, and for the British Archer League, to the opposing team as well. The league teams and results are normally posted on the notice board within a couple of days of the shoot.

I also produce handicap and classification certificates for individual archers if they request them (for competitions) and complete a number of other jobs that need to be done during the year (*like shooting*? – *Ed*. O)

Just out of interest, indoors there are 71 records with a total of 450 entries, and outdoors there are 64 records with again 450 entries. So together we have shot and recorded 900 rounds during the year! In the last year we have also entered 22 postal teams, resulting in 190 league returns.

The best part of the job is watching archers scores improve, and subsequently their classification go up and handicap go down.

The worst part of the job? It's a toss up between trying to work out the owner of a particular score where no name has been put on the sheet, and having to add up score sheet totals, which have not been filled in.

Now you know what being Club Records Officer involves, and what happens to all those scores you hand in.

This article was supplied to me over a year ago, but have only just had the space to print it. It was originally written for Exeter's members but we thought it was worth publishing in the DCAS newsletter. Thanks to Kevin Balding, who at the time was Exeter's Records Officer - Ed.

National Barebow Championships

As some of you may of seen, once a year the National Barebow Championships take place.
