1st Round	Hits 62 Score 306 Golds 2
2nd Round	Hits 63 Score 335 Golds 8
Double Round	Hits 125 Score 641 Golds 10

Geraldine also won the Founder's Perpetual Medal for the Greatest % Improvement.

In the BLBS top 10 2008 Target Rankings Geraldine was 1st for the Double National Round and 4th for the Weston Round. Well done Geraldine!

BOB'S BOOK CORNER



'The Grail Quest' by Bernard Cornwell

"He was suddenly exultant, filled with a sense of power and satisfaction. In that one instant, as the first arrow slid into the sky, he knew he wanted nothing more from life. He was an archer..... Thomas had found his joy. He whooped with delight."

Book 1 - Harlequin

Archers, common men, become England's secret weapon when the English venture across the Channel to take the battle to the French. The army was led by the King, the great Lords and Knights but Thomas of Hookton, as one of those archers is on a personal mission - one he frequently forgets in the joy of fighting - to avenge his father's killing by a French raider and to retrieve his family's treasure. The journey turns out to be far more complex and treacherous than he expects and the enemy who awaits him could harness the power of Christendom's greatest relic, the holy grail itself. The first book in the Grail Quest series ends with the great battle of Crecy, the beginning of what became known as The Hundred Years' War.

Book 2 - Heretic

When the English capture Calais, the war with France is suspended by a truce. Thomas of Hookton still has to pursue the grail and confront his deadliest enemy, his cousin, Guy of Vexille. Thomas and his men become raiders but when he releases a girl condemned to burn as a heretic, his

campaign is attacked by the church and he himself becomes the hunted. Thomas goes to the valley of Astarac, where he believes that the grail may still be concealed but there are many others who are also searching for it. The prize will guarantee victory in battle and the game of hide and seek is deadly. When Thomas finally succeeds in meeting his enemy, fate plays an unexpected hand. What has been a landscape of castles, monasteries, vineyards and villages becomes death's kingdom and the need for the grail, as a sign of God's favour, is more urgent than ever.

Book 3 - Vagabond

Having survived the battle of Crecy, Thomas of Hookton is sent by the King on a mission to discover more about his father's strange inheritance, which is rumoured to be connected to the Holy Grail. He is not the only person searching and his rivals will stop at nothing. Now the holder of great knowledge he is in even more danger and at last he faces his enemy and cousin, the elusive Guy of Vexille.

These three books are available at good book stores priced at about £6.99 published by Harper Collins.

Coaching News by Philip Spavins CCO

First let me tell you a little about myself, I've been shooting since the age of 6 joining my first real archery club Redruth Archers in 1986. I've represented DCAS as a junior and senior at the Intercounties. I generally shoot recurve, but have "dabbled" in compound. I was a qualified county judge for 8 years retiring 6 years ago so that I could concentrate on coaching and my own personal shooting.

What is the role of the CCO?

I asked myself this question when I took office. I see the role of the CCO to facilitate coach education within DCAS. As CCO I am also able to help clubs and individuals to get access to quality coaching.

Level 1 coaching course.

As this goes to press the final pieces have been finished for a level 1 course, Richard Jones Senior coach will be the lead Tutor, assisted by Bob Griffiths-Birds as the tutor, and Phil Carder as the course manager. Due to logistics the course will be in the Pinhoe Exeter. With the new accreditation system coming into place there may be a slight delay before we can run a second level 1 course. If you are interested in becoming a coach please email me at dcas.cco@homecall.co.uk priority at this stage will be given to archers whose club has limited or no coaches, and a maximum of two archers per club. There is a waiting list in place at this moment in time, but please if you are interested still email me.

Level 2 role out

I will be arranging in the near future an update day to facilitate this training some of the key points.

The update day will include self assessment to identify additional training, presentations / training on goal setting, awareness of drugs, planning a series of coaching sessions, risk assessment and Level 2 awareness training. The coach will also have to arrange and document a series of coaching sessions (3) plus a preliminary fact find which must be completed by the 31st March 2011.

Level 1 Accreditation

If you are interested in becoming an accredited tutor, moderator, assessor for level 1 please email me, once more details are released, I will be in contact with you. If you are already a qualified level 1 tutor, moderator, assessor you will have to undergo accreditation in the near future.

County Coach

I would also like to hear from any qualified coaches who would like to advance to county. It is still possible to run a county course with central assessment if there is enough interest then I will look into the possibility of getting course arranged.
