The Grand Western Archery Society regretfully announces the death of their Regional Secretary Janet Faralewski, on Thursday the 30th of December. She peacefully passed away in the company of her son Paul and daughter Nella in Poole General Hospital.

Janet suffered from MS for over 40 years but this did not stop her supporting her son and eventually her husband Eddie on the archery field.

Being bored with just watching she took up the post of event secretary and then club secretary of the Bowmen of Lytchett, and soon got involved at both county and regional level. She converted to the "Dark Side" and became a Judge in the 70's where her polite considerate nature soon won the respect of the archers.

Janet and Eddie became a formidable team organising competitions for their club and their county. In 1986 she became the Chairman of GWAS, and 1990 saw her in her present post as Secretary to GWAS.

In 1992 Janet and Eddie took over the running of Dunster Archery Week and continued the tradition of providing an event that archers wanted to attend.

In 1991 her MS caused her to use a buggy, JAN 1 donated by the Archers, to continue judging and get around the archery fields, where archers soon learnt to keep their bows behind the waiting line, when Jan 1's gearbox gave up the ghost archers from across the country clubbed together to buy JAN 2.

Bernard Cornwell - Agincourt

"All along the French line the visors were being dropped. Hook had seen faces, but now could see only faceless steel. "God be with us," an archer muttered. Hook took an arrow from the bag hanging at his side, he laid it across the bow stave, he drew the cord all the way to his right ear, then released. It was a smooth release, the arrow flew true. There was a terrible noise as thousands of arrowsheads plunged onto steel armour. The broadheads could never hope to pierce plate armour but the blow of their strike was sufficient to knock a man backwards. The French men-at-arms were still a hundred and fifty paces away."

Agincourt is one of the epic battles of history. Fought by two badly matched armies in atrocious conditions, 30'000 Frenchmen against 6'000 Englishmen, it resulted in an extraordinary English victory, a triumph of the common man over aristocracy, which has been celebrated ever since.

Archery Football by Colin Holmes

Tired of shooting for scores, maybe it's time to give the scores a rest and play archery football? To play, two archers shoot 3 arrows as normal. If a 10 is scored, it is a goal (compounds use the inner ten), and if a 9 is scored, it is a goal that may be saved by another archer.

How to save the goal: By adding the scores of the arrows that have not scored a goal of any type, now you have a total score for that end. To save the first goal, a score of 14 is required, and to save a second goal, a score of 21 is required.

A match can be played over any number of sets, and you could have teams of 2,3,4 or more.
