Archers of the West old.....

<u>are 10 years</u>

It seems much more than a decade ago that a few local archers in West Cornwall decided to start their own club. At the time we were looking to form a club to cater for the really competitive archer and to promote that aspect of the sport, along with good coaching practices.

The idea began early in 2000 and after some early discussions the club was formed in June of that year. I remember a few of us having a meal in the White Horse pub at Brixham following their tournament in May. As many good ideas in the past have come from a sketch on a serviette, our club badge was designed.

Our founder members held the very first club members meeting in June and those attending were Graham Mills, Phil Spavins, Andy Latham, Geoff Gardener, Ken Osborn, Jan Martin, Tony Farrell, Pete Mather and Bob Young. Some have stopped shooting; some have returned to former clubs, some are still shooting and involved with the club.

With such a base to our membership we soon showed as a force in DCAS and gained honours at just about every event that we entered. They were great times and with the membership growing we soon had more talent coming along of the likes of Scott Kinsey, Kevin Chidgey and Paul Phillips for Recurve and Compound and Jill Ward and Dennis and Maureen Gibson with their longbows.

The early days were not without their problems and a battle with GWAS regarding our name took place, but luckily sense prevailed and we retained the name we chose. Incidentally, the name Archers of the West was chosen as we had no fixed base when we formed the club and we decided that a generalised name would be quite suitable for our needs.

We liaised with Hayle football club to use their grounds for shooting outdoors and were helpful to them to gain lottery funding for major improvements to their ground and facilities. Indoors we found a great little hall at Leedstown where we still continue to shoot. Our targets are at low level on the stage but are still about 6" above the recognised height from the ground, but it does allow a full 20yards to be shot.

As with most clubs, time passes and changes come about. After a few years members had changed and we had built our membership up with the help of a locally run activity week called LEAP, run through the local council. This was put on to promote sporting activities for the over 50s and archery proved to be the most popular sport chosen by many. We still have many of those people shooting with the club and they are the most enthusiastic bunch of people you can hope for, shooting at every opportunity.

Earlier, in June, the club put on a celebration evening at Leedstown to commemorate the 10th anniversary of the formation of the club. It was a great evening with all the preparatory work and catering being carried out by our own members. Following an excellent buffet we had a small presentation ceremony and followed that up with a quiz.

All of the founder members were invited and only one couldn't make it because of previous commitments. Each were presented with an engraved salver to commemorate the occasion.

Estelle's International Debut

Following my 5th place finish in the England rankings last season I was offered and accepted a place on the EAF (English Archery Federation) winter training squad and then subsequently selected for the Commonwealth Games Test Event team.

In preparation for the Commonwealth Games, EAF ran squad sessions for a small number of compound archers last year and thanks to increased funding from the regions they were able to expand this to include recurve archers this year. These were held at Eaton Manor, near Church Stretton in Shropshire, a venue equipped with both 70m and 18m indoor ranges plus on site accommodation.

In the run up to the test event we had speakers from Commonwealth Games England regarding medical advice, security, etc. and just prior to the test event we were joined by judges Graham Potts and Richard Breese to go through the FITA rule changes and also by some of the GB squad for extra head to head and team round practice.

The Commonwealth Games Test Event was held at Yamunha Stadium in Delhi, India from the 8th – 12th March. The EAF team consisted of 12 archers (3 of each ladies recurve, ladies compound, mens recurve and mens compound) and 4 team management.

The trip was an amazing experience and a fantastic opportunity for me to attend my first international competition.

The reports we had seen prior to departure indicated that the venue was far from complete, but a lot of effort had been put in at the last minute and it was well presented and despite the many finishing touches required it was in reasonable shape.

A great deal of attention had been paid to security with armed guards at the hotels and stadium and police escort for the buses, they even stopped the Delhi rush hour traffic for us!

I scored 591 for the FITA 720 qualifying round, placing me 13th and the ladies recurve team in 4th. We had managed to all qualify in positions that meant no England archers would compete against each other in the early rounds of the eliminations. I won my 1/16 elimination match against Sook Wai Wong from Singapore, before being eliminated in the 1/8 match by Bombayala Devi Laishram of India.

The highlights of the individual eliminations were Louise Colville who knocked out the Indian no. 1 seed in the 1/8 eliminations before being eliminated herself by another Indian in the $\frac{1}{4}$ finals and Nichola Simpson who was the only England archer to make it through to the semi-finals.

In the team event the Ladies Recurve team were eliminated in the quarter finals following a close fought match with Singapore (see photo) and the Gents recurves won their match against Wales for a place in the semi finals. Both compound teams were through to the semis with byes.

Following a re-layout of the field overnight and the installation of the TV cameras, Thursday was team matches semi finals and finals where excellent performances by other England team members resulted in both the Ladies and Gents Compound teams returning with Gold medals and the Gents Recurve team with Bronze.



On the final day, in the individual event Nichola Simpson won the Bronze medal in the individual Ladies Compound.

I would like to thank everyone for all the support and good wishes for the trip. The event was an amazing experience and learning opportunity and has given me the desire to compete in more international competitions in the future. Despite the fact that I obtained another qualifying score towards selection for the team going to the games in October whilst in Delhi, I was unable to get the remaining qualifying score in time for the deadline and did not make it to the selection shoots.

It was nonetheless an experience I will never forget and I would like to thank the team management of EAF for all their efforts in making this a good trip and wish the team going to the games in October all the best.

WHY DO WE NEED JUDGES?

WHO NEEDS JUDGES?

WHY BECOME A JUDGE?

These three questions must be the most frequently asked questions when archers discuss the "whys & wherefores" on the Tournament Field or practice field.

<u>We need Judges</u> for a lot of various reasons; mainly safety and to comply with the requirements of the Governing Body regarding fairness, timing controls and range layout. Also to control the actual shooting and acquaint archers of any relevant information they may need. A judge is also there to help archers enjoy their day's sport.

Just from the above few lines, although they do not cover everything, one can see that there is a requirement for someone to be in charge and that person should be knowledgeable of the rules and regulations.

Who needs Judges? Even a practice day needs someone to be "Field Captain" or Judge to control shooting.

For Tournaments, the level of expertise of Judges varies according to the grade of the Tournament. This applies to all the various disciplines of the Sport

Why become a Judge? Maybe for the usual bottle of wine at the end of a good day's shoot, or the self knowledge of a good day's work – where the "red pen" has not run out of ink and any problems that have arisen have been successfully dealt with and everyone is happy.

Just as an archer is very happy with his day's efforts - especially if he or she has bettered their handicap or even achieves a winning score then the Judge can also enjoy the day and be proud of events. A different outcome maybe, but nevertheless just as satisfactory

We do need Judges, and, if your shooting leaves a little to be desired or you could be looking for something different, please do not be shy – come forward and speak to a Judge, or any Club official - we could be "in need of you" and you do not have to be an "Einstein" to be a Judge. Please think very seriously about this and make a life changing decision for any of the following reasons:-
